



## SEECP ANTALYA SUMMIT DECLARATION

We, the participants to the Summit of the South East European Cooperation Process (SEECP), Presidents: Mr. Recep Tayyip Erdoğan, Mr. Milo Đukanović, Ms. Vjosa Osmani-Sadriu, Mr. Milorad Dodik, Mr. Stevo Pendarovski; Prime Ministers: Ms. Ana Brnabić, Mr. Aureliu Ciocoi, Mr. Andrej Plenković; Deputy Prime Minister: Mr. Dan Barna; Ministers of Foreign Affairs: Mr. Svetlan Stoev, Ms. Olta Xhaçka; Deputy Foreign Minister: Mr. Kostas Fragogiannis and Ambassador of Ljubljana,

In the presence of the Regional Cooperation Council (RCC) Secretary General Ms. Majlinda Bregu and the High Representative of the EU for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy and Vice-President of the European Commission Mr. Josep Borrell,

*Reaffirming* our commitment to the founding principles of the SEECP Charter, the UN Charter, the EU, OSCE and Council of Europe relevant documents;

*Reiterating* our dedication to regional cooperation in South East Europe (SEE) within the SEECP format on inclusive, mutually beneficial and equal basis, as the principal tool toward enhancing stability, security and prosperity of our region, underpinned by international law, democracy, human rights, fundamental freedoms and rule of law;

*Welcoming* the marking of the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the SEECP, which kick-started the unique framework of cooperation in our region and set the foundation for a comprehensive political forum for actions toward a common benefit;

*Emphasizing* the inclusive role of SEECP in promoting and enhancing regional connectivity in political, economic, social, and cultural sense, supported in all areas by the Regional Cooperation Council as its operational arm;

*Recalling* previous Declarations adopted by the Heads of States and Governments as important milestones in the development of our cooperation, particularly the 2019

Sarajevo/Jahorina Declaration paving the way to the South East Europe 2030 Strategy and enhancement of the SEECP framework;

*Reconfirming* the common future and shared vision of South East Europe within a unified, democratic and prosperous Europe;

*Recognizing with concern* the recent global challenges related to the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic and their detrimental socio-economic impact on the region, while also welcoming the solidarity demonstrated by SEECP participants and the positive effects of regional initiatives in this period and creating platforms for sharing learned lessons and preparations for future regional responses in pandemic outbreaks;

*Stressing* our strengthened commitment to build upon and enhance the SEECP framework of inclusive regional cooperation to advance regional connectivity, sustainable growth and socio-economic development, address new and emerging security challenges, promote justice, good governance and rule of law and mobilise international and domestic resources, including Official Development Assistance (ODA) to facilitate the post-pandemic recovery of the region, with full respect of international obligations and in line with our European and Euro-Atlantic partners;

*Underlining* the importance of good neighbourly relations and mutual respect;

*Reaffirming* our determination to work together at the regional level in responding to all common challenges;

Agree on the following:

## **EUROPEAN AND EURO-ATLANTIC VISION**

South East Europe is an inalienable part of the European continent. The region shares with the European Union the fundamental values and principles of an inclusive and sustainable development. The participants recognize the peace and prosperity precipitated by the EU integration and emphasize the common future of all South East European economies in the EU. The participants note the importance of accelerating convergence with the EU and achieving higher standard of living in the region.

The participants call on the EU to reinforce the enlargement process for the SEECP participants, in order to keep the region on the European founding values. European and Euro-Atlantic integration, based on the current commitments and aspirations of individual SEECP participants, is crucial for stability and prosperity of the region.

Participants acknowledge NATO's commitment and contribution to the stability and security in the region with the aim to enhance the political dialogue and practical cooperation. We welcome the continued NATO support for its partners in the region.

The participants pay a special attention to the free movement of people, supporting the Schengen visa-free regime for the SEE region with the EU.

The participants reiterate their strong and sincere adherence to multilateral cooperation, based on shared values and responsibilities. This will be in the service not only of contributing to the relevant EU accession processes but also of transforming our societies in line with the global green and digital trajectories. In this vein, participants emphasize the priorities of social inclusion, sustained and inclusive growth, strengthening rule of law, democratic practices and fundamental freedoms, and bolstering security, peace and stability.

The EU and the region are interconnected and interdependent. Beyond the Membership of some SEECP participants in the EU, there is an undeniable historical, cultural and economic connection with the EU and a common and mutually reinforcing political and economic interest. The participants note the imperative of strengthening the intra-regional cooperation, and cooperation with the EU and other regional and global stakeholders, in order to continue addressing the common challenges for the common good and to mutual benefit. In these efforts, the participants recognize the importance of maintaining synergy, streamlining and efficiency, and establishing viable and open channels of communication within the region and with the European institutions.

Committed to a sustainable and prosperous future and to cooperation as the key tool on that path, the Leaders commend and endorse the South East Europe 2030 Strategy to advance the implementation of the UN Sustainable Development Goals and the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

Determined to advance space for independent media and expanded space for participation of the civil society to address potential deficiencies and democratic deficits in all areas of governance.

Support initiatives and processes that advance reconciliation between SEECP participants.

Sustainable development, underpinned by green and digital transition, will serve the region to support peaceful, inclusive and sustainable societies, promote justice, rule of law, human rights and fundamental freedoms and strong institutions, and address the pressing challenges related to economic growth, income inequalities, demography and human security, poverty, brain drain, depopulation and access to basic services determining the quality of life.

Common Regional Market Action Plan 2021-2024 will additionally assist the capacities of the engaged economies with the achievement of SEE 2030 goals and contribute to the overall betterment of the entire region's socio-economic prospects.

The participants reiterate their adherence to the common values and reaffirm their willingness to further European and Euro-Atlantic integration based on the current commitments and aspirations of individual SEECP participants.

## **ECONOMIC COOPERATION**

The potential of South East Europe as a region in terms of economic cooperation has been underutilized so far and deserves closer attention. SEECP participants share a number of common economic challenges which require a targeted and coordinated response. There is significant room to enhance connectivity between our economies across areas: in trade, investment, infrastructure, human capital, digital, and others. On the other hand, economic connectivity with the EU Single Market should continue to deepen for mutual benefit.

In terms of trade, the total volume of intra-SEE exports represents a share of around 16% in total exports of SEE economies, offering a substantial level of potential to enhance regional trade. Particularly, potential of intra-regional trade growth increases with consideration of promotion and facilitation of trade between SEE economies. The participants recall the comprehensive network of free trade

agreements within the region and recognize the benefits in further developing intra-regional trade links.

Brain drain and depopulation caused by emigration and natural causes threaten to reduce the stock of human capital, lead to labour or skills shortages and a limited capacity to innovate and adopt advanced technologies. The regional demographic trends display the population aging, and dependency of elderly people in the region on the working age population will be surging rapidly in the next decades. The participants recognize the need to take urgent action in a comprehensive and holistic manner, with involvement of all relevant stakeholders, and to address demographic challenges and mitigate its negative effects. Participants therefore welcome the activities, organized by the Ankara Chairmanship in Office and call for a continuation of this practice.

The participants are committed to put special emphasis on youth issues – by promoting educational opportunities, strengthening job employment prospects, developing student exchange programs, as investment in youth is a crucial factor in maintaining democratic and sustainable relations in the region.

Young people are the greatest asset of the region. Providing them with a viable perspective of a prosperous, safe and secure future constitutes a priority for each SEECF Participant. The participants appreciate the regional structures with the mission to improve the wellbeing and connectivity of and between youth in the region.

The participants are further committed to advancing gender equality, including in the economic sector, and women's economic empowerment in line with Goal 5 of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals and the United Nations Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women.

The participants are committed to improving the welfare and ensuring social inclusion of those marginalized and in vulnerable situation/vulnerable and marginalized groups and people living at risk of poverty. Living conditions of the Roma population need to be improved in the areas of housing, education and access to healthcare.

Digital transformation, besides being the cornerstone of keeping up with the global economy, promotes innovative solutions and accessibility to services and sectors

most hit by the pandemic. Participants call for the continuation and extension of efforts to the entire region in improving digital connectivity and capabilities, recognise the importance of development of digital skills and sharing of good practices.

The participants stressed the critical role of supporting international travel and tourism in the recovery of regional and global economies. To that end they renewed their commitment to facilitate through innovative solutions and mechanisms as necessary for international travel of people. In this context they recommended wider practice of safe tourism programmes, which ensures necessary health and hygiene measures throughout travel, transport and hotels.

The participants recognize the pressing challenge of climate change and its effects on the region, from devastating natural disasters to air pollution posing a danger to human health and life and causing significant biodiversity loss. They are willing to closely cooperate in order to contribute to the combat against the global climate change challenges and reaching ambitious climate goals.

Being fully aware of the outstanding economic challenges, the immense potential of the region, and the shared vision of a sustainable future, the participants welcome the South East Europe 2030 Strategy and commit to its principles and implementation. Advancing the path to achievement of UN Sustainable Development Goals in the region, as the Strategy envisages, is the path to peace and prosperity of our societies.

## **SECURITY COOPERATION**

Security challenges and threats evolve each day and adapt to the changing global circumstances. The region has in the recent time seen a proliferation of old and new security issues: instability beyond our region contributing to irregular migration, radicalization and violent extremism, as well as racism, discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance, anti-Semitism, Islamophobia, anti-Gypsyism and hate speech both online and offline, organized crime and illegal trafficking activities including human trafficking and migrant smuggling small arms and light weapons, cyber security, hybrid threats and disinformation, and corruption, as well as the increasingly important natural and human-made disasters. The participants

encourage police cooperation and legal assistance to overcome these challenges and threats as part of the existing international and regional cooperation mechanisms.

Countering these threats requires a coordinated approach based on mutual respect and mutual trust. The participants underline that regional cooperation in the area of security, in line with European and Euro-Atlantic structures, presents the most appropriate and efficient tool of strengthening resilience and minimizing negative effects.

The participants underscored the importance of acting with determination against terrorism in all its forms and manifestations. The participants welcome the activities and the fora for exchange organized under the Ankara Chairmanship in Office on a range of pressing security issues over the course of the year. Furthermore, they recognize and appreciate the high level of solidarity among SEECP participants, as well as the consistent and effective cooperation with the EU and its institutions.

The participants underlined the need to combat racism, discrimination, xenophobia, anti-Semitism, Islamophobia, anti-Gypsyism, as well as hate speech both offline and online and any kind of extremism and recognized the importance of education and awareness raising to eliminate negative stereotyping of persons.

Participants commend RCC's role in bringing together under one umbrella different regional security platforms and organizations aiming to avoid overlapping and improving efficiency in fields of cooperation such as: the South East Europe National Security Authorities (SEENSA); the South East Europe Military Intelligence Chiefs (SEEMIC), control of Small Arms and Light Weapons (SALW) together with UNDP and the South Eastern and Eastern Europe Clearinghouse for the Control of Small Arms and Light Weapons (SEESAC). Furthermore, leading role of RCC in the concept of the Integrative Internal Security Governance (IISG), built on cooperation in PCVE-CT, fighting organized crime represents a good step towards better cooperation in these fields in the wider SEE area.

As has already been showcased by number of natural and man-made disasters, especially earthquakes and floods, inflicted upon the region in the last decades, cooperation and solidarity is a remedy without alternative. Prevention and preparedness is the best recipe for avoiding catastrophic consequences. The COVID-19 pandemic, an unprecedented global challenge in the history of mankind,

demonstrated dramatically the importance of interdependence, mutual reliance and cooperation. To that end, we the Leaders of the SEECP participants call upon the respective capitals and the RCC to work closely together in fostering and strengthening of the awareness raising in the region on disaster risks, with a view of ensuring coherence of SEECP participants' preparedness and prevention mechanisms, aligned with the EU Civil Protection Mechanism and the NATO's Euro-Atlantic Disaster Response Coordination Centre, and other relevant regional and global stakeholders. As the natural and man-made disasters, including pandemics, will continue to plague the globe and the region alike, the use of regional mechanisms and protocols for cooperation and assistance will be an important factor in exchanging experiences, encouraging preventive actions, reducing risks and enhancing resilience as we face new challenges.

In that context, the participants discussed about the strengthening the synergy between the RCC and the Disaster Preparedness and Prevention Initiative in SEE (DPPI-SEE) as an appropriate regional framework for this purpose.

Flows of irregular migrants, asylum seekers and refugees are complex and multidimensional issues with a humanitarian dimension. COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated the pre-existing vulnerabilities of migrants and asylum seekers/refugees. Only joint coordination, smart policies and concrete assistance, including humanitarian, may provide an appropriate response and relieve pressure on SEECP participants most directly affected by the migration crisis. SEECP participants call for international solidarity, equitable responsibility and burden sharing in this regard and for continued engagement toward a joint solution based on international obligations. Furthermore, the participants reaffirmed their commitment to address the root causes of migration and step up the fight against human smuggling and trafficking through international cooperation.

## **COVID-19 RECOVERY**

The participants note with regret the enormous toll COVID-19 pandemic has taken on human life in the region, and express their sincere solidarity with the victims.

The complete uprooting of socio-economic activity caused by the pandemic and the containment efforts will continue to weigh heavily on the global and regional



economy. Return to the path of sustainable growth, with full utilization of potentials of green and digital transition, is of crucial importance.

The pandemic has showcased a high level of global and regional solidarity. Among the SEECP participants, assistance had been provided in terms of medical and other critical equipment needs required to combat the pandemic as well as vaccines. Participants recognize that only mass vaccination can stop the spread of the pandemic and mitigate the negative impact on public health and economy. COVAX is a crucially important mechanism on the global level and participants call for a swift and fair distribution of COVID-19 vaccines.

We call upon the capitals and relevant regional and global authorities to support activities aimed at paving the way for a steady supply chain of all necessary medical equipment, including vaccines, in times of need, to protect public health and safety. Positive example of the Green Lanes initiative, during the initial outbreak of the pandemic, can serve as good starting point to continue our joint efforts toward ensuring an uninterrupted flow of goods and the necessary medical equipment.

We call on the authorities to look into possibilities of cooperation in the area of vaccine development and to consider mutual recognition and deployment of Covid vaccine and recovery certificates to facilitate safe international travel and tourism.

### **SEECP-RCC SYNERGY**

With the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the SEECP platform, the participants recognize the important achievements of regional cooperation in terms of stability, security and prosperity. There is now an ever greater potential for growth, which the participants believe will be best utilized with a continuous SEECP-RCC synergy.

The participants welcome the efforts invested by the Ankara Chairmanship in Office which has, together with other participants, worked on exploring the most appropriate modalities for strengthening the role of the RCC on the basis of effective synergy between the SEECP and the RCC tandem.

Under the guidance of the SEECP Working Group, RCC's operational and secretarial support to the-SEECP has been made clearer, in line with the SEECP and RCC founding documents. In this vein, the intensified relationship between SEECP

and RCC, as the participants agree, will enhance the capacity of the SEECP as the leading regional platform of cooperation in South East Europe.

As the political umbrella of the RCC, SEECP participants furthermore recognize the added value of RCC as the hub of regional cooperation and its capacity to streamline regional initiatives. Where appropriate, streamlining should be utilized to ensure efficiency and avoid duplication or overlapping of efforts.

We endorsed the Consolidated Conclusions of the Working Group that set out and initiated new ideas with an aim to further improve the efficiency, visibility and the functioning of the SEECP and the RCC.

We expect that upcoming Athens Chairmanship in Office will continue the good efforts to revitalize SEECP – RCC synergy in an effort to facilitate its work in financial and logistical terms, aiming to better serve our framework and the EU aspirations of all non-EU member participants in times to come.

Participants will continue their efforts to reach a consensus, in line with the relevant provisions of the RCC Statute, on the selection of the RCC Secretary General for the term 2022-2024.

## **PARLIAMENTARY ASPECT**

With the expansion of regional cooperation, the participants recognize/reaffirm the importance of the engagement of the parliamentary dimension. The all-inclusive SEE 2030 Strategy acknowledges the Parliamentary Assembly of SEECP, as an important platform for exchange among regional parliamentary bodies, contributing at the same time to harmonization with the EU legislative standards.

The participants therefore note the continued absence of Permanent Secretariat of the SEECP Parliamentary Assembly. They will continue their efforts to resolve this issue in accordance with the relevant rules of procedures in a constructive and fruitful way.

At the same time the participants commend the successful steering of the SEECP Parliamentary Assembly by the Ankara SEECP Chairmanship-in-Office.

## **ANKARA SEECP CHAIRMANSHIP-IN-OFFICE**

The participants express their highest appreciation for the effectiveness and dynamism of the Ankara SEECP Chairmanship-in-Office conducted under the motto “Neighbours SEE Together” which reflects the common future of the peoples of the region who live side-by-side.

As a founding participant of the SEECP, Ankara hosted number of activities with an aim to strengthen the regional ownership and inclusiveness principles in line with its seven priority areas.

Activities and events organized by the Ankara Chairmanship-in-Office, which were complementary and provide added value to existing efforts to address regional challenges, have increased interaction among the SEECP participants and increased the visibility of the SEECP.

Despite the challenges emanating from the ongoing pandemic, the Ankara SEECP Chairmanship-in-Office organized more than 40 events in line with its Chairmanship priorities, complete list of which is annexed to this declaration.

## **THE INCOMING SEECP CHAIRMANSHIP-IN-OFFICE**

The participants welcome the incoming Athens Chairmanship-in-Office for the period 2021-2022 and that Podgorica will assume the SEECP Chairmanship-in-Office for 2022-2023.



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**CONSOLIDATED CONCLUSIONS**

**OF THE SEECP WORKING GROUP**

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- Considering the important role of the SEECP in addressing common regional challenges;
- Recognizing the uniqueness of the SEECP as the most inclusive platform for the regional cooperation;
- Welcoming the key role of the RCC, under the political umbrella of the SEECP, in promoting regional cooperation in South East Europe;
- Emphasizing the institutional and secretarial role of RCC in supporting SEECP's effectiveness as its operational arm;
- Underlining the need for improving and facilitating RCC's work in financial and logistical terms;
- Appreciating the initiative of the SEECP 2014-2015 Romanian Chairmanship-in-Office which led to the establishment of the Ad Hoc Working Group;
- Noting that 2015 Tirana Summit Declaration also suggested to continue exploring new recommendations with an aim to further improve the efficiency, visibility and functioning of the SEECP;
- Taking into account the fact that some of the conclusions of the Working Group, adopted at Tirana Summit in 2015, could not have been realized;
- Aware of the need for taking over the previous work of the Working Group and moving it forward to revisit the idea to promote the SEECP and to increase its added value;
- Acknowledging the initiative taken by the SEECP 2020-2021 Turkish Chairmanship-in-Office to reactivate the Working Group five years after its last meeting to discuss these issues;

- Following the conclusions of three meetings of the Working Group, on 7 October 2020, 10 December 2020 and 26 January 2021;

The SEECP Ad-hoc Working Group reached the following conclusions:

1. On improving the efficiency of the SEECP;

We agreed on the fact that the definition of the operational/secretarial support required to be provided by the RCC to the SEECP, as it is envisaged by the RCC Statute, needs to be clarified with a precise framework.

In line with this, RCC has been tasked to assume and started executing active secretarial role to the SEECP by, inter alia;

- providing extended administrative and logistical support,
- assisting the drafting of SEECP Declarations and decisions in line with the guidance of the SEECP Chairmanship-in-Office
- preparing and circulating the minutes of the relevant SEECP meetings with a view to standardizing the language of official SEECP documents,
- keeping an official SEECP archives,
- assisting in designing a specific SEECP webpage, which is, to be co-managed by the Chairmanship-in-Office and the RCC Secretariat.

2. On RCC's Legal Status;

We decided that RCC needs to update its financial reporting and budgeting methodology for better transparency and accountability.

We found out that the discrepancies between the RCC Statute and the RCC Financial Management Manual should be eliminated in order to attain a more efficient and transparent financial reporting.

To this end, in line with the recommendations of the SEECP National Coordinators, RCC Secretariat initiated a process to update and adjust RCC's Financial Management Manual, which is envisaged to be concluded before the next budget cycle.

Working Group also discussed the following;

- Reviewing the role of the SEECP in addressing common regional challenges,

- Promoting SEECP's role regarding coordination among regional organizations functioning in South East Europe and its support to these organisations' visibility and efficiency,
- Representation and interaction of the SEECP at other international and regional organizations to promote its visibility,
- Enhancing coordination and synergy with the relevant regional and international organizations to promote SEECP as the principal forum of cooperation in South East Europe,
- Eliminating possible setbacks emanating from the inconsistencies between the RCC Statute and RCC operations,
- The need for more regional cooperation in terms of disaster preparedness in light of the Covid-19 pandemic,

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The contribution of the SEECP Working Group to the work of the SEECP as the most inclusive platform in the region and to RCC as its operational arm, aiming at enhancing regional cooperation, was noted. Continuation of this Working Group will be instrumental in boosting the synergy between the SEECP and the RCC as well as increasing the visibility of the SEECP."
